History's Scent Trail

PENHALIGON'S, the perfume house established in the 1870s, has a storied history. Oscar Wilde and Rudyard Kipling were fans. Queen Victoria appointed it the court perfumer. Winston Churchill counted its Blenheim Bouquet as his favorite fragrance, and Princess Diana adored its Bluebell scent. Now, having mined its vast archives, the company is incrementally releasing an Anthology collection of 12 oldies but goodies. Arriving in the United States next week are the latest: Eau de Cologne, a faithful recreation of a classic citrus from 1927; and Orange Blossom, a lush honeyed floral - with neroli, tuberose and sandalwood - inspired by the 1976 original. Summer in a bottle. Or two.
